Dear Member,

This will be the last bulletin until September, as I shall be on holiday and will in any case not have the facilities to churn out a bulletin. It will also be the last bulletin that unpaid up members shall receive, and those members shall now have to re-join the Club.

There are a number of items of interest to some members. The B.M.C. circulars include the topics given below:

DAMAGE TO PROPERTY IN LLANBERIS AREA.

Since some small numbers of uor members frequent Wales, this may be of interest to them. We appear to be, as a Club Lakes constipated - there are other areas in which mountains of all shapes and sizes are to be found..! However, here is the item:

'Damage to walls, gates, hedges and even Climbing Huts has occurred as a 'protest' or 'retaliation' against 'the estate owner's decision to restrict camping in the Llanberis valley. At the present time when the B.M.C.s. North Wales committee are hoping to make some sort of arrangement with the owner for camping is quite the worst for such activity from our point of view.

Some of the 'protester's' are climbers. We do not know if they belong to B.M.C. member clubs. We very much hope not. Could member clubs, however, please bring to the notice of as many as possible of those who are likely to be in the valley, the advantages of good behaviour just now. If this news can be spread by member clubs, it may reach the perpetrator's of the damage.

SAFETY.

Being the summerseason, there will be a fair number of school parties in the Lakes. Some of our members will probably be taking parties themselves, this being probable, I feel it worthwhile to include this item from the B.M.C. circulars.

'Bhe committee were greatly concerned with the high accident rate, particularly to novices, in the early part of the year. They asked the Ministry of Education to issue a circular to schools about the need for experienced and knowledgeable leaders of parties - this was still on the stocks A letter to the press on safety was issued and attracted some comment. Instructional meets for beginners were recommended to clubs. The B.B.C. were asked again to show their mountain rescue film and it was decided also to prepare a new poster on safety'

I do not know if the information I have given is up to date, and whether in fact, the Ministry of Education have issued a circular to schools, but party leaders should endeavour to find out.

There are a number of points which members taking parties might consider:

- (a) Adequate supervision must be given by 'sir' or 'miss' at all times. perhaps the introduction of a few sheep dogs would help....!!?
- (b) Adequate clothing and footwear by party; many little accidents can be avoided in ensuring this
- (c) Ensure that the party is medically fit. I remember a case of an Outward Bound laddie, suffering from exposure; it was found that this lad was an Epileptic. an unfortunate incident which could have been avoided, had this fact been kmown. As it was it meant that a rescue party were out from 7 p.m. until 3 a.m. in bad weather.
- (d) Can party leaders read a map.. (don't laugh! Iv'e met some that can't) and use a compass. No need to say any more on this.
- (e) How many party leader's know what to do when a member of their party has an accident. They should read the pamphlet published by the Mountain Rescue Committee.

There are perhaps many more points not mentioned, but can apply to members as well as party leader's....
....or are we all now so confident of our craftsmenship on the hills.

A change of topic, though I make no apology for the length of the foregoing stuff. Barry Ayre writes the following:

'It has been suggested that the Club Bulletin may be a useful medium for members disposing of, or obtaining, unwanted climbing gear. With a membership of over 250, it seems possible to assume that someone, somewhere, wants to obtain or dispose of some item!

Such a useful service could also help to offset the expense of duplicating and distributing these bulletins, and perhaps a small charge of 2/6d per 'Classified Ad' could be fixed. '

Well here is a very useful suggestion indeed, and a nominal charge of the sum quoted above will be made. We are not in a position to take Ads for disposing of wives or

husbands, boy-friends or girl friends!

Finances.

A request for some information on the finances of the Club has produced the following items which are food for thought!

Mr. Rose (your Treasurer) tells us that our debts total; £3,081. 18. 7..! They are made up by the outstanding loans from the diocese totalling £2,650 on both huts, a bank overdraft on the Main Account of £73. 14. 3. (as at 6. 30 p.m. on the 30th June), and one on the Dunmail Account of £358. 4. 4. (as on the 18th May) which is likely to be wiped out by bookings this year. We should think of the last two knowing the present Bank Rate and the Diocesan debt at half the rate.

It may also be a rather sobering thought to know that annual demands on the Main Account only for the usual Rates, Taxes, Insurances, and similar basic overheads including the interest charges, average out at about 46 per week. If, and when we wipe out our debts we should still have about 44 a week to find.

In addition, Hut Committees have their normal running expenses, repair, maintenance and replacement charges to meet.

Are we all careful 'housekeepers'... Have we and our friends all paid our new subscriptions.. Are many of our Guests becoming members...

A big step forward was taken at the last meeting of the Management Committee when the personal loans of rather long standing made by Bishop Pearson were cleared — but for this the above debts would have been greater by £235. Cheques for £100 from the Langdale Hut, £100 from the Dunmail Hut and his Lordship's generous aside 'Forget the rest' were real stimulants.

So much for finances, this item was asked for just to put members in the picture over the debts, I for one had no idea of the amount involved.

Visiting Clubs.

This latter meet will be held for the purpose of organised work on the hut. Any member not wishing to partake, must stay away - they will not be allowed to stay otherwise than working. It will also be a members only weekend - we expect to have the offer of so much help that there will be no room for guests in anycase.

Committee Member Roba.

Due to the corresponding increase of the number of members using the hut, it has been found necessary to warden this hut, at weekends only. The warden, shall be one of the Committee members, who will have complete charge and authority. The job is mainly to see that noise, cleanliness and general behaviour is compatible with membership.

The wardem can suspend members immediately from using the hut, and, an appeal by the offender, will only be allowed at the next committee meeting. It would mean of course that the offender would not be allowed to use the hut, until the business had been cleared up.


