FROM GOSFORTH RECTORY

SPACE

It is difficult to avoid being out in the dark at this time of year isn't it? Personally, I don't like it much, unless you can see the moon and the stars. When that happens, another perspective is offered by the darkness. Instead of hemming us in - it shows us SPACE.

When the Apollo 14 astronaut, Alan Shepherd, returned from the surface of the moon, in February 1971, he told reporters: 'When I first looked back at the earth, standing on the moon, I cried...'

I imagine Alan Shepherd's reaction to the fresh perspective he received on that day was a mixture of awe, as well as a new found appreciation for the dramatically vulnerable situation we are all in - spinning around in space with no one to hold on to. Alone in creation...Alan Shepherd saw SPACE from a new angle...and cried. He could see the vulnerable focus of God's amazing love — 'the earth...which is the Lord's... and all that dwell therein' as it says in Psalm 24.

The way people see life has always been limited by their opportunities. Some people feel that they are trapped. Others scale the heights to see wide horizons for exploration. Today, in our post- covid world, many of us have literally had to discover horizons are no longer physically limited. Modern technology has given many of us the opportunity to explore ideas that never even occurred to our grandparents. Paradoxically, these tiny bits of technology have become the prism through which vast new worlds can be 'virtually' open to us. Some of these worlds are good places. Sadly...some are not. Is the 'virtual' traveller as likely to be moved by his or her new perspective on the world as Alan Shepherd? I am not so sure...

2023 years ago, wise men left home to follow a star through SPACE. They crossed boundaries of race, creed, comfort and culture to discover a very different kind of 'prism' laid in a manger. The prism was a baby to 'look through'. The offer of a new perspective laid on the straw. The child was set there for us, just as the earth is set in space for God.

Looking through this prism, the wise men saw Immanuel... 'God with us'. They saw the human hand of God - put there for us to hold on to as the world spins around in the dark.

Looking through this prism, the wise men saw the Christ...the 'God who saves us'. They saw Jesus and his cross...an anchor to cling to as the world falls headlong through space.

The view might have brought tears. I have no idea...

God has given his earth... 'and all who dwell therein'...a prism through which to understand life. It doesn't need recharging or de-fragging. You can't drop it, or crack its face. You can't get an 'app' for it. It can no longer get viruses. Its power is inexhaustible. Sometimes people declare that it is dead. It is not. It is complete... and it is ours for no pounds and no pence exactly.

To look through this prism blows a person's horizon wide. Through it each one of us sees something 'bespoke' and free. Frankly, I am amazed more people aren't curious enough to stand and gaze. 'Why bother?' people might say. Well, don't want to scare you....but it could be worth an openhearted peek.... because through this prism we find the gateway to heaven. I hope February's not too dark and cloudy for us all this year!

St Olafs, Wasdale Head Faith in the Fells

2022 REVIEW

Worship -There were 31 services at St Olaf's in 2022, average attendance 14, level pegging with 2021. The year's services ended on a joyful note with a packed 'standing room only' Festival Communion on Christmas Day. 9 services were led by Philip and retired clergy, and 22 by lay ministry. Worship at St Olaf's is ecumenical, and its liturgy reflects our faith in the fells mission.

There are now services in Wasdale every Sunday morning throughout the year, the first and third Sundays at Nether Wasdale at 9.30, and the second and 4th Sundays at Wasdale Head at 11am, and at both on Christmas Day and Faster

Visitors & Pilgrims — we welcomed just over 28,000 visitors to St Olaf's during 2022. The busiest month was August (4134), the quietest January (884). We didn't have the digital people counter in place for all of 2021 but in the months when we can compare (August to December in both years), we welcomed 17% more visitors in 2022. A very approximate estimate is that 40% come from Cumbria, 45% from the rest of the UK and 15% from abroad. It is good that so many from other faiths visit St Olaf's, and so many who claim no faith at all.

During the year our visitors filled 172 pages of our prayer folder with 749 prayers. Almost half of them concerned illness and bereavement, which helps us understand the value of the quiet and humble sacred space that St Olaf's provides for those who seek it. Many of the prayers were for Ukraine, and in September and October for our late Queen and her family.

Financial – Income increased from £8300 in 2021 to £14000 in 2022, general expenditure remained at £6500 in both years. £6000 of the 2022 surplus was absorbed by professional fees relating to the restoration, most of which will become payable before the restoration starts in the Spring of 2024.

The church's one foundation is Jesus Christ the Lord – the 1st line of the hymn is so true at St Olaf's! Its walls are a metre thick at the base and just sit on the ground, there are no foundations. It has worked for 500 years and counting!

February services: Sun 12th Morning Worship, Sun 26th Holy Communion, both at 11am. There are weddings on Sat 4th at 12noon, and Sat 25th at 10.30am.



FEBRUARY BOOK REVIEW

WILD FELL by Lee Schofield (Fighting for nature on a Lake District hill farm)

I belong to the U3A Readers Group that meets monthly in St Mary's Room in Gosforth and one of our books to read over the Christmas/New Year period was this book, which I was instantly attracted to by its cover, showing a Golden Eagle soaring above a lake.

Lee is an ecologist and site manager for the RSPB in Haweswater on the eastern edge of the Lake District, a landscape-scale nature reserve, taking over the tenancies of two working farms in the valley, Naddle and Swindale, in 2012.

Sadly, the golden eagles are no longer there, along with many other birds and wild flowers, due mostly to the changes in farming practice since the 1950's when there was a great push to boost productivity following the war years, and with the introduction of grants and subsidies, modern agricultural machinery, synthetic fertilizers and new medicines, the number of sheep had doubled by the mid 1990's.

No one realized at the time what an affect this was having on the wildlife of all our valleys. Where were the lapwings, curlews and corncrakes that I remember so well in my childhood?

This is the story of how Lee and other conservationists in the valley are working, along with some of the local farmers, towards redressing the balance between rewilding and respecting cherished farming traditions.



SAINTS FOR FEBRUARY – Cyril and Methodius

Ignore all the romantic hoo-hah associated with the 14th of February and think of two brothers - Cyril and Methodius - who are remembered by the Church of England on that day. They died in 869 and 885 and are described as 'Missionaries to the Slavs'. Although of Greek origin, they worked, after overcoming a lot of difficulties, amongst Slavic peoples and were able to celebrate Holy Communion in that language. After Cyril's death



his brother translated large parts of the Bible into Slavic. They were described by the Pope in 1980 as 'Patrons of Europe'.
