Does prayer make any difference?

According to a nationwide poll in 2018, 51% of the population pray. People pray for different reasons, often people pray out of desperation, as the saying goes "there are no Atheists in foxholes", when we reach the end of ourselves and have no idea where to turn, we might pray. Jesus seems ok with that as he says in his famous sermon on the mount, "You're blessed when you're at the end of your rope. With less of you there is more of God and his rule". For me these are often my most honest prayers as they can reflect the reality of what I am feeling not just what I am "supposed" to say. Whilst it is common to pray for people, places and things, the reality is we can't control them, and prayer can help us, as in prayer we can try to let go of our desire for control.

Anyone who has been part of the 12-step fellowship can understand this. They will tell you that when they hit rock bottom, they couldn't find a way out and it was only out of that place of admitting that they are powerless to change that they started to find sobriety, which means balance. They had to let go of their control, their way of handling things. Prayer helps us with this as it takes the attention off ourselves and helps us to open up to something greater than ourselves, something that I believe is within each of us.

I have had many conversations with people about spirituality, (it goes with the job) and whilst many don't believe in God, in their own words, they do believe there is something greater than themselves and it is usually something to do with love, that draws us all together. I find this helpful as I believe that God is love, and it is love that binds us together, and this, tied with the Step 11 of AA, helps me to practically see the value of prayer. Step 11 encourages us "through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood God, praying only for knowledge of God's will for us and the power to carry that out." Prayer is not about saying the right thing, it is about changing us as we try to let go of our will or our control. Maybe this is why it can be hard work, and why we can find it uncomfortable and disappointing at times especially when we don't see prayers answered.

As a Priest, do I feel disappointed at times when I pray? Yes, I don't always feel a sense of the presence of God, I don't always get the outcome I desire and sometimes I don't want to take the right action that I sense I should. Do I always feel safely wrapped up in the love that I speak about? I have to say no, I often feel my own lack and fears and anxiety can take centre stage. Yet most days I will get up and the first thing I do is spend time praying, often in silence. Why?

Despite my own doubts and my failings, I have come to believe that a power greater than myself can restore me to sanity (Step 2 AA). Praying helps me to ground myself, it helps me improve my conscious contact with God, if only through acknowledgment, and in doing so helps me to live more consciously in the world. As we look towards Autumn and the change in season, can I encourage you to pray however you see fit, give thanks, sit in silence, ask for help, I do believe prayer changes things, but it probably changes us the most.

St Olafs, Wasdale Head faith in the fells

SEPTEMBER SERVICES at St Olaf's:

JOSS NAYLOR - much has been written about the remarkable life of Wasdale's most famous son, and one wonders if his greatest long term legacy will be his huge contribution to good health by inspiring so many perhaps thousands - to take up fell running, surely one of the healthiest sports of all. Those present (over 1200 attended the funeral) will never forget the sight of more than 1000 of them running over the fells from all directions to lead the hearse carrying Joss on his final journey from Down'y Dale Bridge to St Olaf's. The moving sound of a solitary trumpet accompanying a young runner chanting 'Swing Low, sweet chariot, coming forth to carry you home', with some approving bleats from herdwicks, were the only sounds in an otherwise silent valley, as the runners 'carried Joss home'. Canon Richard Lee took the service which was expertly broadcast to the many in the churchyard and adjacent field, so with a liberal supply of service sheets everyone was able take part in the service. Joss is buried near the church door, in sight of Middle Row, where he was born.

LAMMAS DAY - On Sunday 11th August, with a well-attended church, we celebrated Lammas Day (Loaf Mass Day). It is the festival of first fruits when a loaf baked with flour from newly harvested grain is brought into church and blessed. In our case it was small baps freshly baked by Carolyn, who led the service, traditionally one of the oldest celebrations between the agricultural world and the Church. Big thanks to the many attended this special service.

BUSY WEEK - Lammas Day marked the end of a busy week at St Olaf's as we once again welcomed a group of eighteen Polish 7th Day Adventists from Yorkshire, who held their morning and evening prayers, and their main weekly worship on Saturday, in St Olaf's. It is good to hear worship in another language in our ecumenical church, and their enthusiasm is inspiring.

In memory of Joss Naylor: 'King of the Mountains'

Not conquest, but a partnership of grace, each tip-toe footfall stepping every stone. Now he's returned to dale he never left, the small church crouched below the highest contours.

He shepherded flocks on needle, scree and crags, and spread of fells glanced from his birthplace window. He ran the ridges furrowing the sharpest peaks, a fifty mile a day collie shared his rhythm.

He'd read the fells for forecast, Lingmell fading, Gable Novembered under tonsuring snow. A chime of names, from Red Pike round to Whinn Rigg; sentinels like the yews that now surround him.


He left in longest light; hay-making season. Pause after baling, incense scent of grass. Inside the church few quick steps to the altar; no racing, now, just presence, beckoning.

Plain space no bigger than a lambing barn welcomed him home. Fells gathered in clear visions. Runners came from each angle of the land; thousand, as called to memory of a king. He'd once have given the nod to each of them.

BECKERMET NEWS

By the time you are reading this the school holidays will be coming to a close and most will have enjoyed their summer break whether locally, nationally or internationally depending on choice and affordability. If you are one of the many who have had your summer vacation, I hope that you had a great time and managed to get time away with family and or friends. If you are still to have your holiday then you have something to look forward to before the nights slowly start to get longer.

Recent events in various parts of the country have been awful to watch on the national news, night after night. We in Cumbria have experienced very little of what has been happening up and down the country. It is very sad when a small proportion of the community can do so much damage and destruction to the area/country they say they are passionate about. The one positive outcome has been the overwhelming support shown by all the various communities affected by coming out in support of those members of our society being targeted by this small minority of thugs, hell bent on trying to stir up hatred. As well as the support shown it has also been good to see that the justice system has dealt with those involved swiftly and will continue to root them out.

We all need to work together for the benefit of our communities and it is great to see and hear about what is going on in the various villages in West Cumbria. Whenever and wherever these activities/events take place, it is nearly always down to a small band of local volunteers who freely give up their time for the benefit of the community in which they live. Many have undertaken such tasks for many years, while others may have only recently become involved having moved into the area. These volunteers are the backbone of each village and often go quietly about their activity without seeking anything other than knowing what they have done has benefitted others within their community.

Beckermet is no different from all the local villages with many unsung volunteers always willing to give up their time and energy for the benefit of others. Every week there are numerous activities organised by volunteers for others to enjoy especially in the village Reading Rooms which is at the heart of our village life. With the vast majority of these activities now taking place there, it was decided that a defibrillator was needed. This had been installed outside the entrance to the building which means we have two such machines within the village. Hopefully they may never be required to be used but, like an insurance policy, they are there if ever needed.

As explained in the last magazine, volunteers spent many hours preparing for Cumbria in Bloom. The judges visited the village in early

July and appeared to be impressed with all the hard work undertaken. We will now have to wait for their verdict, which will not be forthcoming until 14th October. Regardless of the outcome, the village has seen a lovely transformation with lots of colourful tubs of flowers in various areas of the village, not to mention the community spirit that it created with those who volunteered their services.

The two youngsters of the village who were supported with their experience of spending time in Tanzania, while a third was chosen to represent the sea cadets at the 80th D-Day landings, have returned from their experience of a lifetime and will be giving talks to various groups in the village. I for one am looking forward to listening to their adventures and the knowledge they gained from undertaking such an experience. Our usual village activities continue as normal with Coffee Cake & Chat taking place each Tuesday morning and Thursday afternoon. A monthly quiz night and bingo evening also take place, all in the Reading Rooms. Regular adverts of our activities are placed on both the Reading Rooms & Beckermet Village Facebook page, as well as posters in the noticeboards.

St John's Beckermet church services continue at 9.30am on the second and fourth Sunday of each month with Rev Philip Dorling taking the first of these, which includes communion, while the other service is taken by the Rev Rachel Cunliffe or a member of the PCC. Everyone is welcome to attend as the church is open to all regardless of denomination and is a valuable asset of the village.

A Trip to Malta

Rachel and I have recently returned from a holiday to the island of Malta. We spent lots of time exploring the island's history which is outstanding in terms of its breadth and depth. The island was a key trading post in the Mediterranean and its location would shape the history of the island for 3000 years. Phoenician traders first



colonised the island circa 1000 BC before control was replaced by Carthage. The island was absorbed into the Roman empire after the Punic Wars becoming a Roman free town. It is at this point, in 60 A. D., that St Paul the apostle was shipwrecked on the island and introduced the population to Christianity.

The collapse of the Roman empire meant Malta had multiple conquerors until the 9th century when it was conquered by the Arabs. The Arabs left a strong influence on the island's language and place names. From the 11th to the 15th century, the fate of Malta was intertwined with that of many other European monarchies, such as the Houses of Normandy, Aragon and Castile. Until ultimately becoming part of the unified Spanish Empire under the Holy Roman Empire Charles V by 1530. It is at this point that the island's history becomes intertwined with the Order of Knights of the Hospital of Saint John of Jerusalem, or the Knights of St John for short. The Knights began as a monastic order to run hospitals for pilgrims visiting the Holy Land, however with the rapid expansion of the Islamic Ottoman Empire, the Knights were evicted from Jerusalem and moved first to the island of Rhodes and then further west to Malta. The Ottomans tried to take Malta in a giant navel assault in 1565 known as 'The Great Siege', however they were defeated by the Knights, led by Grand Master Jean Parisot de la Valette. The capital of Valetta is named after this Grand Master following it construction after the Great Siege.

With the Ottomans kept at bay, the next few centuries saw a period of stability and growth with the noble families of Europe endowing money on the Knights for the protection of their Christian lands. It is during this time that many of Malta's opulent Baroque churches were constructed, including the co-cathedral in Valetta. The French revolution first deprived the Knights of an income stream and when Napoleon arrived in Malta in 1798 on his way to Egypt with the French naval fleet, he captured the islands. Napolean removed the Knights and stole a lot the island's

paintings, gold and treasures, which went to the bottom of the sea when Admiral Nelson destroyed the French fleet at the battle of the Nile.

Following the end of the French revolutionary wars, Malta became a British Crown Colony, which was of strategic importance in the 19th century, especially with the opening of the Suez Canal. The First World War saw Malta used as a military hospital, mainly to help the wounded following the disastrous Gallipoli campaign in Turkey, but it was the Second World War that would really test the island. Malta was essentially a fortified aircraft carrier, used by the Allies to disrupt Axis supply lines from Mussolini's Italy to Rommel's German convoys in North Africa. As a result, Malta received a very high level of bombing as the Axis tried to cut the island off and starve it into submission. Many brave naval convoys battled to get to the island suffering very high casualties. However, the bravery of the island held out and King George VI awarded the whole island the George Cross medal. As a result, the island was instrumental in defeating the Germans at the famous battle of El Alamein in 1942. In 1943 the island was again strategically very important in Operation Husky, the Allied invasion of Sicily, leading to the surrender to the Italian Navy.


After the war Malta focused on rebuilding the island and independence from Britain came in 1964 and 10 years later became a republic in 1974. There is a clear cycle to Malta's history due to its strategic location of regularly being on the dividing line between two competing powers. From Rome and Carthage, Christianity and Islam, France and Britain, and the Allied and Axis powers of World War 2.

SAINT FOR SEPTEMBER - Theodore of Tarsus

On the 19th of September the Church of England remembers Theodore of Tarsus, who died in 690 at the age of 88. Common Worship describes him as Archbishop of Canterbury, but he was more than that. He is considered to be the second founder of the See of Canterbury (after Augustine). He travelled widely, reinvigorating dioceses as he did at Canterbury, establishing schools, and he is regarded as the first Primate of England. He carried on working into what even today is regarded as old age, and he is said to be one of the great figures in our history.




